Dear Alumni and Friends,


The <u>Department of Hispanic Languages and Literature</u> hopes this message finds you well and enjoying the beauty of the season as we celebrate this academic year together.

During the celebration, students participated in traditional games, learned to dance the famous "quadrilha," a folkloric square dance, and enjoyed typical Brazilian sweets.




Spanish Tutorial and Writing Center Presents: Talleres en Español


PhD Candidate Catalina Joseph, Recipient of The Edward Guiliano PhD '78 Global Fellowship Program

PhD candidate <u>Catalina Joseph</u> was named an Edward Guiliano, PhD '78, Global Fellow for her project titled, "Transnational Connections in Horror Comics from the Metropolitan Cities of São Paulo and Buenos Aires" in São Paulo, Brazil.

Full-time doctoral students in the College of Arts and Sciences may utilize this award for research toward a journal article, dissertation, or related work of artistic expression, as well as for outside-of-the-academy career development.



PhD Candidate Milena Acosta, Recipient of The Edward Guiliano PhD '78 Global Fellowship



PhD candidate <u>Milena Acosta</u> was granted an Edward Guiliano Fellowship, which offers students the opportunity to carry out self-directed research, creative expression and cultural activities for personal development through traveling outside of their comfort zone. Milena will be traveling to Berlin's *The Ibero-Amerikanisches Institut* (Ibero-American Institute (IAI) funded by the prestigious College of Arts and Sciences, Edward Guiliano '78), to conduct research about the making of the book, *Indios*, *Ejército y Frontera*, by the Argentinian literary scholar David Viñas.

PhD Candidate María Paula Lizarazo, Recipient of The Edward Guiliano PhD '78, Global Fellowship

Thanks to the <u>Guiliano Global Fellowship</u>, PhD candidate **María Paula Lizarazo** traveled to the Amazon rainforest to visit a mobile library initiative led by the Tukano (or Magüta) indigenous communities and the Omacha Foundation in Puerto Nariño and Tarapoto Lakes, at the frontier between Colombia and Peru. During the research, she also attended the course Amazon: conservation and storytelling for its future, taught by international documentalists, including the Oscar-winning Pippa Ehrlich.







Valentina Pucci, Edward Guiliano Global Fellowship Recipient, meets Blas Matamoro in Madrid



The Edward Guiliano Global Fellowship supported our doctoral candidate **Valentina Pucci's** <u>archival</u> <u>research</u> on Blas Matamoro, an exiled Argentine writer and co-founder of one of Latin America's first LGBTQ+ rights organizations.

This research, conducted in Madrid in February 2025, was instrumental in developing the dissertation's theoretical framework on queer authorship and performative politics in Argentine literature. Thanks to this fellowship, Valentina was able to analyze Matamoro's personal archive and to interview him in person at the Café Comercial.

Sebastián López Vergara Hosts Visit with Michael Wilson and Jose Antonio Lucero



Last Spring, **Michael Wilson**, Tohono Oʻodham human and migrant rights activist, and **José Antonio Lucero**, professor of Latin American and Indigenous Studies at the University of Washington, Seattle, visited Stony Brook University to present their book, *What Side Are You On?* Wilson and Lucero also visited HUS150 (Latin American Indigenous Peoples), where they discussed the long-standing humanitarian crisis at the border and Mike Wilson's decades-long efforts to support migrants. The visit was organized by Sebastián López Vergara, with support from HLL, NAIS, and LACS.

PhD Student is awarded the Turner Summer Research Grant in 2025

Jeannette Rivera Negrón was awarded the Turner Summer Research Grant to advance her dissertation. The grant covered travel expenses to Puerto Rico, allowing Jeannette to delve into non-circulating early 20th-century resources at the University of Puerto Rico library for her dissertation on nation-building discourses and insular imaginaries.



Portuguese Language Book Club



During the spring semester, a new edition of the Portuguese Language Book Club took place. In collaboration with LACS, Monica Vicentini, our visiting faculty in Portuguese, led a discussion of the celebrated short story "Venha ver o pôr do sol," by renowned Brazilian author Lygia Fagundes. The event connected participants interested in Brazilian language and literature, making it an inspiring conversation.

HLL and LACS Series: Inclusion and Exclusion in Colonial Latin America: Languages, Embodiment and Sexuality



In April, HLL and LACS hosted two roundtables under the theme "Inclusion and Exclusion in Colonial Latin America: Languages, Embodiment, and Sexuality."

The sessions featured scholars and artists such as Antonio Feros, University of Pennsylvania, José del Valle (CUNY), Daniela Ortiz, alumnus Víctor Pueyo, Temple University, Zeb Tortorici, New York University, and María Emma Mannarelli, San Marcos University. Over 100 participants joined in person and online to discuss the intersections of colonialism, language, body, and sexuality. On April 24, 2025, HLL and the Institut Ramon Llull celebrated La Diada de Sant Jordi, Catalonia's Day of Books and Roses, with a lecture by Laia Miralles (Universitat de València / University of Chicago). Her talk, "Dying Like a King: Funerary Practices in the Early Modern Ages," explored the political propaganda surrounding the death of Louis XIII in 17th-century Catalan literature. The event was organized by our THEM Lab, directed by Paul Firbas with the help of the Institut Ramón Llull and the collaboration of Quim Solias and Anita Rescia.



Anita Rescia Publishes Essay on Guillermo del Toro's Pinocchio



Congratulations to our doctoral student **Anita Rescia** for the publication of her article on Guillermo del Toro's *Pinocchio!* In March 2025, Anita published a transhistorical and transmedial analysis of Carlo Collodi's famous children's story, *The Adventures of Pinocchio.* The essay appears in the book, *Fantasía*, aventura y sociedad: Perspectivas contemporáneas, by Los Libros de la Catarata.

Early Modern Print Culture in Catalonia

On April 7, 2025, our THEM Lab hosted a hybrid lecture titled "Sources for the Study of Print and Press in the Early Modern Period in Catalonian Archives." The talk was given by Professor Xevi Camprubí (University of Barcelona / Autonomous University of Barcelona) and explored the rich archival materials that illuminate the history of printing, journalism, and literature in the Spanish Golden Age. Quim Solias Awarded Custard Institute Meadows Museum Travel Fellowship


